IS MEN'S GYMNASTICS IN AMERICA DEAD IN THE WATER?


Let me answer this question with a resounding YES! Unless we approach educators, college presidents, athletic directors and high school athletic associations to make them aware of the value of amateur athletics. especially gymnastics. As with many other endeavors, gymnastics will also fall by the wayside. Many universities have already dropped historically rich sports such as swimming, diving, gymnastics, wrestling, badminton and archery!

Historically, gymnastics dates back to 2600 B.C. in China with the real development occurring during the Greco-Roman periods of history and it has continued to progress through our various educational systems. Gymnastics has been the basic and integral part of all athletics with an emphasis on strength, coordination, agility, endurance and safety. The military academies all still require gymnastics for their cadets; WHY?

Other reasons for sponsoring sports is to give young people opportunities! To help keep them off the streets, in school, and provide them with positive role models for them to achieve happy. healthy and productive futures. Not every athlete is 6'-5" and 250 lbs.

A very important fact which was driven home by Don Peters (SCATS Gymnastics Academy) in an address to coaches in the gymnastics club industry. He said and I agree! "Men's collegiate gymnastics has served as the main training ground for coaches, both male and female, over the past 30 years." Some things that need to be considered: (1) Where have our coaches come from? (2) Where have the ideas and techniques come from? (3) Who are the safety spotters in our gyms? Without men's gymnastics, the women's programs will also eventually disappear! There are currently 20 coaches in Arizona alone that have come from the Arizona State University men's team.

Men and women's gymnastic programs need to work hand-in-hand to help each other stay alive and become successful. I hope that each and everyone realizes that men's gymnastics has been and remains the catalyst that makes gymnastics a reality in our country.

In closing I would like to invite everyone to go and see the movie "Mr. Holland's Opus." Let's not let this happen to men's gymnastics! Children are our future! Let's fight together to keep their opportunities alive. You can help by contacting (call or write) the NCAA and your local politicians, colleges and universities. Let them know you care. If you don't, who will?

EDITOR'S COMMENTS

The editor believes that Don Robinson's article on the present status of men's collegiate gymnastics in America should be read and digested by everyone who maintains an ongoing interest in the preservation and progressive evolution of sports in this country. His points are most valid! Although, never a big money-making sport like football and basketball, collegiate men's gymnastics has served a most vital role in contributing to the growth of physical and mental health and that all important personal quality we call 'character!' To drop men's gymnastics (for whatever reason) from collegiate or high school athletic programs is nothing short of criminal in any way one cares to look at it!

As could be expected, MONEY appears to be the biggest problem! In today's ultrai-materialistic and hedonistic society, the importance placed on MONEY is more than sinful. Like the NFL and NBA, colleges and universities want a 'piece of the action!' A UNIVERTSITY is supposed to be a sacred institution that provides UNIVERSAL utilitatian education and opportunities! When it fails in that regard by dropping men's gymnastics and other minor sports from its program agenda....it ceases to be a UNIVERSITY!

Those of us "Old Timers" who had not seen a U.S. Trampoline competition for many years were appalled and pleased at the magnificent way in which the meet was organized and conducted. Executive Director Ann Sims and Organization President, Chris Sans and their staff certainly did a fantastic job in conducting a competition that was 'first class' in every respect! tumbling was absolutely The phenomenal with two of Dave Green's Flip City Tumblers working out of Full-In, Full-Outs to Triple Back Somersaults! We were a little dissapointed with the skill level of Trampoline and Double Mini-Tramp performers but they all did a great job and are bound to improve!

By stating that we were a little dissapointed at the skill level of Trampoline and Tumbling, we don't mean to imply that the competitors did not do a superior job in presenting their routines. Perhaps, during America's "Golden Age" of Trampolining (during the late 1960s and early 1970s), when great performers like Wayne Miller and Alexandra Nicholson ruled the roost, many of us became spoiled. We were reminded that since American competitors Dan Millman and Judi Wills won the first World Championships in London in 1964, the United States dominated International competition for many years thereafter. Things since then have changed! The Russians, French, Canadians, Australians and South Africans are now the Kings and Queens to beat!

Our Trampoline, Tumbling and Double Minitramp competitors will certainly try to do just that at the F.I.T. World Championships scheduled for Vancouver, British Columbia in late August of this year.

Members of the WORLD ACROBATICS SOCIETY were well represented at the competition and were given royal treatment by everyone. 







FREE STYLE SKIINGS AN EARLY HISTORY

Sometime, during mankind's remote past, a single individual from a cold climate, strapped a pair of long thin boards onto his feet and learned to propel himself across the snow. Cross-Country skiing served as a practical means of transportation. Perhaps, it was not long after when man learned to ski downhill and at one point in time, purely by accident, some skiier hit a bump in his path that caused him to involuntarily execute an aerial forward somersault! This, of course, is pure speculation, but it appears to be highly plausible.

EARLY DOCUMENTED HISTORY

The type of skiing known as freestyle or "hot dog" skiing goes back at least to 1915, when a skiier named Carl Paulson did a single front flip on skiis at the first American Inercollegiate Ski Meet at Hanover, New Hampshire. The modern era of freestyle skiing began in the mid 1950s. Art Furrer, a Swiss, began teaching tricks while working as a ski instructor in the U.S. and he did much to popularize skiing acrobatics through demonstrations, films and aricles during the 1960s.


In 1971, ski cinematographer and freestyle innovator Dick Barrymore and the K-2 Ski Company sponsored the world's first hot dog contest in Aspen, Coloado. Barrymore's concept was that the winner should be the skiier who made the hottest, fastest, most exciting run down the toughest slopes in the area.

Three days later, in Waterville Valley, New Hampshire, Skiing Magazine and Chevrolet sponsored the first true freestyle event called "The National Championships of Exhibition Skiing", won by Herman Goellner. This contest was divided into three events - moguls, or bump skiing, ballet and aerials. Freestyle contests still continue to use the three events today. One other contest was held that season, The Rocky Mountain Freestyle Skiing Championships in Vail, Colorado with the total purse for the first season at \$20,000. As the activity gained in popularity, many sponsors came to the fore such as Midas, Chevrolet, Skiing Magazine and Colgate Palmolive. Like any other new sport, however, freestyle skiing had its problems and as each year progressed, one wondered if the sport would survive.



AN EARLY HISTORY

CONTINUED



THE POND ERA 1974-1978

At the beginning of 1974, freestyle skiing was on the threshold of entering a new developmental era. Charlie Pond, for years, had been one of America's most successful men's gymnastics coaches! Considered by many as the nation's top tumbling coach, Charlie's long career at the University of Illinois had garnered both him and his teams many honors from Big-Ten and NCAA Championships to the Olympics.

Upon retirement from the U of I, Charlie started the Utah Academy of Gymnastics in 1973. A group of freestyle skiiers living in Salt Lake City approached Charlie one day seeking help in the learning of aerial twisting somersaults on skiis. This was a challenge that Charlie could not refuse. As the inventor of a unique "twisting safety belt" for teaching such skills, Charlie went to work with the young skiiers, using the trampoline, diving techniques and his twisting belt. With the help of one of his students, Frankie Bare Jr., Charlie began to develop some skilled freestyle skiiers who could safely execute multiple twisting somersaults on skiis.

With safety for the athlete always foremost in his mind, Charlie developed a progressive system of teaching techniques that included the trampoline, a slanted trampoline, an apparatus to propell students upwards called an 'air pup, a straw skii slope and a ski slope over water. Diving was definitely an important part and parcel of Charlie's training program.

HOT DOGS & HOT MUSTARD!

If the freestyle skiiers of the pre-Pond era were known as 'hot dogs', it was Charlie's teaching program that added the 'hot mustard' to their competitive routines. With skills such as double and triple twisting double backs and twisting triple somersaults (many of these performed by Frankie Bare Jr.), it was the Utah Academy of Gymnastics that provided the hot mustard recepie.

The Utah Academy of Gymnastics became 'the' place to train for the new circuit that was being formed in the Fall of 1974! This circuit would provide both sponsor money and national T.V.coverage as well. Charlie took a freestyle skiing judges course in 1974 and soon after, was selected as Head Judge and then Superior Judge for the 1975-76 season.

A new association called The U.S. Freestyle Association was formed and Charlie was elected as Executive Director and National Coach. The 1975-76 season included competitions in Austria, Switzerland and Italy. At the close of the 1998 season, the International Olympic Committee recognized the new sport and accepted it into the Olympic agenda! The McCormick Sports Conglomerate soon took over the sport but would not accept Charlie's concept of Safety Certification. As a result, Charlie resigned his positions and retired from active participation in the sport. Perhaps, one of Charlie's greatest achievements was the success enjoyed by his star pupil, Frank Bare Jr. who successfully performed a 'Triple-Twisting Backward Quadruple Somersault!" Wow! What will they think of next?



This would be a once-in-a lifetime opportunity to attend and be a part of an historical event that would have meaningful significance for all time! Obviously, we eagerly accepted the invitation.

Just prior to our scheduled departure date for Atlanta, we had planned to attend the 1996 U.S.A. Trampoline & Tumbling Junior and Senior Championships at the Civic Plaza in Phoenix, Arizona. We were able to witness most of the competition, but had to leave on Sunday morning, July 7th in order to reach Atlanta in time for the unveiling.

Thus far, this had, indeed, been a busy summer with an earlier trip to Pennsylvania to visit relatives, a trip to California where we visited the Cirque San Jose and a planned tour of Europe scheduled to begin on August 1st. I also had some information and pictures to send to Bob Bollinger for the W.A.S. July Newsletter. It would be a busy busy summer to say the least!

The 'Flair Across America" Statue was created by sculptor Richard Macdonald and was designed to serve as a monument to celebrate the 1996 Olympic Games. The inspiration for the statue had its origins with American gymnast, Kurt Thomas who first performed the 'flair' in international competition.

The 22' high Flair Statue celebrates the triumph of the human spirit! The heroic bronze statue epitomizes the credo of the Games that the essence lies not in the victory but in the struggle. The monument was to be permanently installed in Georgia International Plaza, directly in front of the Georgia Dome, where the gymnastics events will be featured. The 'Flair' journeyed by truck from California across the breadth of America stopping at several cities along the way before arriving in Atlanta. The Ceremonies were a magnificent occasion, the memory of which, Jerilyn and I will cherish for the rest of our lives!

PROFESSIONAL ACROBATICS!

HOW DID IT ALL GET STARTED?



No one actually knows when "Professional Acrobatics", as a recognized institution, initially began. Archaeologists have often uncovered interesting pictures of acrobats on the walls of tombs in ancient Egypt and Chinese pottery shards dating back to 5,000 B.C. depict acrobats in different modes of performance. We do know that professional acrobats performed in Ancient Crete and were paid to handspring and somersault over the heads of charging bulls. A dangerous activity to say the least!

MEDIEVAL FAIRS

Professional Acrobatics, as a recognized institution, probably had its origins in the Medieval Fairs of Europe that were commonplace between 1300 and 1800 A.D. Traveling Fairs that went from province to province and kingdom to kingdom always featured tumblers, contortionists, rope walkers, trapeze artists, hand balancing acts, clowns and jugglers. The Medieval Fair throughout England, France, northern Italy, Spain and the Holy Roman Empire (comprising most of today's Germany) was eagerly looked forward to by peasant and Lord alike as it served to delete some of the boredom that was commonplace during that age.

Medieval literature is full of marvelous tales concerning acrobats, their general popularity and in some cases, descriptions of the feats they performed in some detail. Some of these feats and performances are rather strange and bizarre when measured by today's standards. There exists documented evidence of a French monk by the name of Bruno of Avignon who, for a period of 21 years, won an acrobatic competition called: "Le saut, le sifflet, le culbutte capoter et le bumbulum!" (A jump, a whistle, an aerial somersault and the passage of gas!). How this gymnastic type competition was judged is open to question, but whatever the case, by the time Bruno was done competing, he had amassed a fortune in prize money and livestock.

Most people today equate "professional acrobatics" either with the circus or with Hollywood stunt people. The first real circuses appeared in England as early as 1750 (perhaps, even before), but it was not until the legendary P.T. Barnum started his circus in America in the 1830s, that the "circus" became a true home of the professional acrobat. During the later half of the 19th century, the tent circus both in America and in Europe became immensely popular. There were many popular circuses in America. Some of the great shows were Cole Brothers Circus, Pollack Brothers Circus, Forepaugh & Sells, Ringling Brothers and more recently, the Shrine Circus. When Barnum and Bailey combined with Ringling brothers, they became known as "The greatest Show on Earth!" One must also not forget Buffalo Bill's Wild West Show that featured among other things, acrobatic trick riding.

The Circus, as we know it today, was an outgrowth of the medieval fairs and strangely enough, both fairs and circuses have survived to this day and still offer a haven and job opportunity for professional acrobats!

ENGLISH & AMERICAN VAUDVILLE

No discussion of professional acrobatics would be complete without mentioning the turn of the century vaudville stages in England and the United States. Vaudville often featured professional acrobatic performances and for over a 30 year period, some of England and America's greatest acrobats and movie stars got their start on the vaudville stage. Cary Grant, Joe E. Brown and Burt Lancaster are a few of many. Since its first inception, the movie industry has served as a mecca for professional acrobats with the many opportunities it offers for stunt men and women.

The future for professional acrobats, indeed, looks bright. Circuses or "cirques" as they are often called are flourishing as never before. The following pages briefly discuss three of these. Cirque San Jose, All-American Acrobats and the Cirque Du Soleil proudly carry on an ago old tradition of acrobatic professionalism at its best!



Chris performs a one hand handstand atop Bogdan's head, then lowers to a one arm planche! It's all in slow motion requiring superior strength and balance! There are no misses or near misses! 

U.S.A. 1996 OLYMPIC TEAM TRIALS INDIANAPOLIS, INDIANA

BRUCE HARLAN of OHIO STATE WON THE 1948 MEN'S 3 METER SPRINGBOARD CROWN!

I will never forget the post war Olympic Diving team trials in the early summer of 1948. The competition was held in Detroit, Michigan and three of our divers, Sammy Lee, Vicki Draves and Bruce Harlan went to London, England and came home with gold medals. Since that time and until only recently, American divers (both men and women), have dominated the sport internationally.

The list of American divers that have won gold medals since then, in Olympic competition, is long and endless. It ranges from the original three mentioned, to what may be termed The "Greg Louganis Era" of modern times. Perhaps, one reason for America's dominance of the sport for the past 45 years is the fact that after World War II, most all of Europe and certainly, China were in ruins while the United States, for the most part, was left politically and economically intact. It would take time for the rest of the world to stabalize its economies, its political institutions and its power in international sports like platform and springboard diving.

Italy was the first post-war nation to produce an Olympic diving champion with Klaus Dibiasi in the mid 1970s! Since then, the former Soviet Union and the People's Republic of China have come to the fore by producing superior competitors in all of the diving events. Even during the "Louganis Era", Greg had a hard time holding on to the Olympic Gold with formidable threats from both the Soviet Union and China.

The Olympic Team Diving Trials in Indianapolis, Indiana last month, were indeed, hard fought in both men and women's divisions. All the great American diving coaches (past and present) such as Dick Smith, Dick Kimball, Ron O,Brien, and Sammy Lee, to name only a few, were there to provide assistance and encouragement to our American divers in their forthcoming battle in Atlanta. Most all of them will also be at the Centennial Olympic competition.

Russia and particularly, China will again be formidable opponents as they have been in the past! Our American men and women divers want only to do their very best and continue a legendary 45 year tradition in Olympic Diving! They comprise a strong team and assuredly, they will put forth a magnificent effort! Will they be able to do it? Only time will tell. We wish them our very best!

DR. SAMMY LEE




1948 OLYMPIC MEN'S PLATFORM CHAMPION!



SAMMY LEE In his early 20s, wins the 1948 Olympic Men's 10 Meter Platform Crown!

Imbued with a strong family tradition for pursuing "excellence", a young Korean American from Fresno, California stepped onto both the 10 meter platform and the 3 meter springboard at the 1948 Olympic Games in London, England. His pursuit for excellence was rewarded with a gold medal in men's Platform Diving and a bronze medal on the springboard. In 1952 at the Helsinki Olympiad, Sammy Lee again won the gold medal in Men's Platform diving becomming the first male diver ever to win back-to-back gold medals!

During the past 45 years, Dr. Sammy Lee has continued to pursue "excellence" and has, perhaps, been honored by more than any other athlete in our nation's history! The honors bestowed upon Sammy by both athletic organizations and U.S. Presidents are far too numerous to be listed in a short article such as this one.



A recent photo of Dr. SAMMY LEE finds him still smiling and in great shape!

As the 1960 U.S. Olympic Men's Diving coach, Sammy produced a gold medalist in Bob Webster on the 10 meter platform and a silver medalist with Greg Louganis at the 1976 Olympiad in Montreal! He also served as Olympic torch runner and flag bearer at the 1984 Los Angeles Olympic Games. Sammy served on the President's Council for Youth Physical Fitness under Presidents Eisenhower, Nixon, Ford, Carter and Bush! He was the representative for Presidents personal Eisenhower, Nixon and Reagan for the 1956 Melbourne, 1972 Munich and the 1988 Seoul Olympics! In 1953, he received the James E. Sullivan Award and was inducted into the Swimming Hall of Fame!

Recognized world-wide as a motivational speaker, Dr. Lee's honorariums are donated to his "WhoSam Award", given annually to a coach and diver who does not smoke or drink. His personal philosophy- "To be 100% fit is to exercise not only your mind and body but to be blind to the color of each other's skin and deaf to each other's accent!" Sammy's life has been dedicated to that principal and we salute him!

"JUMPING JOE GIALLOMBARDO"




TUMBLER SUPREME!

His parents were poor Italian immigrants who had come to America after a devastating earthquake in 1908/had claimed 30,000 lives in their small hometown near Messina, Sicily! Joseph Giallombardo was born in 1917 on Mayfair Road in Cleveland, Ohio's "Little Italy" section and the eary years of his life were filled with both tragedy and trauma! At age 7, his mother died and Joe's father, being unemployed at the time, was forced to put Joe and his brothers in a Catholic orphanage for many years. Perhaps it was a rough childhood, a natural born instinct, or a combination of both that would fill young Joe with a resolve and determination to succeed in life by conquering adversity.

Small and quick with an agile frame, Joe's first love was football, but although he possessed the speed, agility and strength, at 5'5" tall, Joe soon learned that football was not his sport. At an early age he acquired an interest in tumbling and gymnastics and enrolled in the Cleveland Turner's Gymnastics Club. While there, he not only improved his gymnastic skills but learned to tumble with great speed and dexterity. As a teenager, he won the Ohio State Tumbling Championships three years in a row! By saving his money. Joe was able to enroll in the University of Illinois in 1935 and become a member of its gymnastics team.

It was at Illinois that the young Ohio athlete acquired the nickname "Jumpin Giallombardo!" He won three National All-Around Gymnastic titles and was a winner in seven individual events, a record which held for over 40 years! He and George Nissen first met at the Ringling-Brothers Circus winter quarters in Bloomington, Illinois and became life-long friends. After George quit competing in the late 1930s, Joe went on to win several National Tumbling titles and is reputed to be the first American tumbler to bound three full-twisting back somersaults in one routine! During World War II, Joe served in the U.S. Navy and was instrumental in helping to write the Navy's training guide for gymnastics in the U.S. Navy's pre-flight training program.




After the War, Joe returned to school and earned a Master's Degree in Physical Education. He accepted a teaching and coaching position at New Trier High School in Winnetka, Illinois which was then rated as the No. 1 secondary school in America for both academics and sports. While there, as Boy's Gymnastics Coach, he taught outstanding young athletes that would later become Olympians. Among these were Ray Hadley and John Culbertson, Joe entertained audiances with his professional Trampoline act. He also became an outstanding juggler.

Up until only two years ago, Jumpin Joe was still active in coaching gymnastics at a private school in the Chicago area. Now retired, at 79 years of age, Joe and his wife Edith live in Wheeling, Illinois. Jumpin Joe is also a talented singer with a typically beautiful Italian voice. He sings with a Barber Shop Quartet that has won many national honors! "Jumpin Giallombardo" has "jumped" into the hearts of all that know him and we in the W.A.S. organization proudly salute him!

TRAMPOLINE & TUMBLING

DAN MILLMAN The "Peaceful Warrior!"

OUR FIRST WORLD CHAMPION!

It was mid-March and the violets were already blooming in London's Hyde Park, just across the street from the Albert-Victoria Memorial and the Royal Albert Hall in Kennsington! Ted Blake, the Meet Director from Brentwood-Essex had done a magnificent job in setting up the first World Invitational Trampoline & Tumbling meet that would officially be known as the First World Championships! The meet, sponsored by the Nissen Trampoline Co. in the U.S. and the Nissen subsidiary in Brentwood-Essex had gone to great lengths to make this a memorable event in the sport's history. In every respect, it was!

Along with the United States and England, several European nations and even South Africa, sent skilled competitors to the meet. Music by London's famed 'Cold Stream Guards' served as part of the Opening Ceremonies. A 'knock-out' system pitting competitor against competitor was used as an elimination for the finals competition. The skill level by those competing was excellent even by today's standards!

Judi Wills (now Judi Wills Cline) was the first World Champion ever in the Women's Division with Nancy Kay Smith of Sycamore, Illinois close behind. The Men's competition was equally excellent and when the final results were in, it was Danny Millman from California, the first Men's World Champion in the sport of Trampoline!

Danny was born in Los Angeles, California in 1947, the son of Herman and Vivian Millman. His athletic training began at the early age of nine when he found himself the only boy in a modern dance class where his mother played the piano as an accompanist. At age 10, he began the study of Judo, one of the numerous martial arts he would study; eventually, he would win his black belt in the art of Aikido.

He soon began the study of gymnastics and at age 17, he won the United States Gymnastics Federation Trampoline Championships and also competed for John Marshall High School in Los Angeles. It was as a student at the U.C. in Berkley that he won the First World Trampoline Championships in London. He also became a three-time All-American and N.C.A.A. champion. In his junior year, Dan won four gold medals at the Maccabiah Games in Israel. In late 1967 he suffered a shattered right femur in a motorcycle accident but surprised the word by recovering in time to become Co-Captain of the NCAA Championship Team in 1968, as well as Nissen Award Nominee, Senior Athlete of the Year and Gimbel-Student Athlete of the year!

In 1968, Dan was appointed Director of Gymnastics at Standford University. There, he coached U.S. Olympian Steve Hug and brought Standford University into national prominence. In 1972, he joined the faculty at Oberlin College. Several years later, after traveling around the world, he returned home to pursue a brilliant career as a writer and lecturer. Dan has authored 8 best selling books, including "The Inner Athlete" and "Way of the Peaceful Warrior!" His work has inspired millions in 16 languages world wide! We are proud that Danny Millman is a Life-Time Member of W.A.S. We proudly salute him as one of our own!




